

SADLY AN ANIMAL WELFARE CRISIS IS WITH US

As a member of the Association of Dogs and Cats Homes (ADCH) we are seeing how hard it is at the moment for many of the country's rescues. While rescue work is never easy, it seems that this is the start of a real crisis caused by a rise in pet ownership rates in the pandemic colliding with cost-of-living pressures. ADCH members are seeing an increase in animals coming into care with centres full or close to capacity, as rehoming slows down and more people are looking to give up their pets.

Recent research by the ADCH shows that demand for rescue dogs has declined in the past year while the number of dogs being abandoned is higher in 2022 than 2021 and 2020.



70% of ADCH member rescues surveyed, report an influx of dogs with behavioural issues. This is in line with studies indicating that inexperienced dog owners are giving up dogs they acquired during lockdown and are now unable to care for, due to a variety of factors.


Halita Obineche, Executive Director of ADCH, says:

"There was a huge surge in people getting pets in lockdown and we are dealing with the fallout. Inexperienced owners unable to manage pets with behavioural issues caused by poor training and a lack of socialisation; workers returning to the office; and now the rising cost of living, all combining to create a national animal welfare crisis."

As well as giving as much financial help to rescues to pay vet bills as possible, Schnauzerfest is determined to promote pet adoption. If you've been thinking you might one day foster or adopt a dog, now is the time to act. Rescues need money and they need people to adopt.

PIPPA'S FUTURE IS FAR BRIGHTER NOW

When Pippa's rescue asked us to help with the costs of orthopedic surgery we knew how vital it was for her to be pain free and mobile. Pippa was struggling physically and emotionally to adapt to life out of the puppy farm where she'd spent years as a breeding dog.

For some, the adjustment can be hard, as, however terrible the conditions they lived in were, it was a familiarity they'd learned to endure and survive in. When dogs are released or seized out of the breeding industry they often take with them many years of psychological as well as physical damage. Pippa had both to recover from.

A Grant was quickly agreed and her leg surgery went ahead.

A few weeks on and Pippa is doing really well. She's steadily getting into a more normal routine with her family.

Julie tells us more about their journey together,

"Pippa is by far was the most damaged dog I have ever had. I don't think that she will ever fully recover as she is severely emotionally damaged. However, she has made great progress, even if the average person may not think so. She used to sit in the furthest corner of the garden and hide, now, with her surgery, she definitely wanted me, saw me as comfort."
